Help to create new and tailor-made services



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

Why do we tackle sustainable waters?

- Endangered environmental status of the Baltic Sea and regional waters
- Impacts of climate change on aquatic ecosystems
- Need for common approach to strengthen water management
- Need to move from finding good water quality solutions to their implementation



What can you do?




Adapt water management practices across sectors

Apply good practices to prevent water pollution

Improve procedures and implement methods to remove pollutants

Adjust planning process to lower the impacts of climate change

Why do we address blue economy?

- Plentiful water and marine resources for sustainable economic growth
- Need to further support blue economy businesses
- Need for climate-resilient solutions and clean shipping
- Conflicting interests in the use of water and sea space



What can you do?



Develop value chains for blue economy products and services
Diversify blue economy products

Promote clean shipping
Introduce common environmental standards
Improve management of sea and inland water traffic

Foster maritime cultural tourism

Test models for mitigating conflicts

Facilitate joint use of water and land



Why do we address circular economy?

- Growing ecological footprint of the region and waste production
- Overexploitation of the natural resources
- Gap in creating norms and standards for circular use of resources
- Need for knowledge and solutions to develop circular strategies across different sectors

What can you do?



Develop tools for creating industrial symbiosis

Apply cross-sectoral cooperation for better integrated planning processes

Use digitalisation to support sharing economy initiatives

Change behaviors of society and entrepreneurs

Test green public procurement models





Why do we address energy transition?

- Realise green transition
- Decarbonisation, reduction of greenhouse emissions & supporting renewable energy
- Reaction to the energy crisis
- Different levels of energy production & consumption



Why do we address mobility?

- Need to mitigate greenhouse gas emission and other pollution stemming from increasing passenger and freight mobility
- Need for further support to urban areas and their hinterlands
- Need to change to green and alternative fuels and multimodal mobility
- Need for better use of information in mobility systems

What can you do?



Space efficient or low-emission mobility of all modes*

Coordinate planning infrastructure and technologies for renewable fuels

Integrate shared solutions for freight mobility

Create and test digital tools (transnationally!) for integrated and optimised services

Develop common standards for compatibility of green solutions

Change mobility behavior and demand

What can you NOT do?



Several unrelated local pilots, where the "solution" is a collection of project results

"Good practice" compendium or policy recommendations with nobody to apply them

Develop local infrastructure without benefiting transnational development

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Supporting the EUSBSR


- EU Strategy for the Baltic Sea Region
- First macro-regional strategy agreed between eight EU Member States and the European Commission to strengthen cooperation in the Baltic Sea region
- ✓ Objectives: save the sea, connect the region and increase prosperity
- ✓ Action plan: important actions for implementation, thematically organised in 14 policy areas
- ✓ **Operational management**: coordinators of the policy areas and Baltic Sea Strategy point

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
