



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Start with the SPECIFIC challenge









Be realistic, specific and focused!

If a challenge is complicated, try to break it down and deal with specific aspects.





Be realistic, specific and focused!

If a challenge is complicated try to break it down and deal with specific aspects.

"The Baltic Sea is unhealthy due to pollution"

"Point-source nitrate pollution stemming from agricultural sources is not adequately accounted by regional authorities"





Be realistic, specific and focused!

If a challenge is complicated try to break it down and deal with specific aspects

"The transport sector needs rapid decarbonisation"

"Medium-sized cities often lack resources for cooperating with surrounding communities in planning intermunicipal transport"





The objective of your project should be to help your target groups tackle the challenge.


If your challenge is **too broad,** then your project's **impact** cannot be assessed!





Understand your TARGET GROUPS

Definition: Organisations that are **affected by the challenge** and have the **competencies or mandate to influence it**.







Your target groups should be competent to address the challenge, and must be interested in using your project outcomes.

It's not just about who is related to the project's theme, but rather who has an active role in addressing the challenge.

Your target groups should be competent to address the challenge, and must be interested in using your project results.

It's not just about who is related to the project, but rather who has an active role in addressing the challenge.

Since your challenge deals specifically with medium-sized cities, it's important that they are involved as target groups to represent their own needs and competencies

Local public transportation providers can use your project results to increase their capacity to solve intercommunal issues

It's not just about who is related to the project, but rather who has an active role in addressing the challenge.

While national authorities might have relevant ministries and policy making authority in the field of transport, they're not the ones who will be applying your solution/output/outcome/etc.

Similarly, while universities and applied science institutions are important in the field of research about your topic, they aren't the ones that will be using your outputs

Be aware of your target groups' needs at the stage of application!

As with the challenge, be specific in identifying the needs of the target group

Barriers should already be known before you begin. How will you help TGs solve their problems if you don't know what the problems are?





My target groups need...



- To have barriers identified

~ Better guidance and methods of cooperation

Better, but still somewhat unspecific. Doesn't tell us much about what is needed by each target group, and almost *any* project activities could be sufficient to "address" this need.



My target groups need...

- Local authorities need better access to transregional data, and public transport authorities need a better way to be enaged in intermunicipal decision-making processes



My target groups need...



- To have barriers identified

~ Better guidance and methods of cooperation

+ Local authorities do not have sufficient access to transregional data, and public transport authorities need a better way to be enaged in intermunicipal decision-making processes Even better! It's clear who needs what, and there is a clearer understanding about how the project can be set up to meet these needs.



Outputs of your project

durable and tangible products used by the target groups after the end of project



Explain what you plan to do and how

Describe how you involve target groups

in your work plan

Be clear about content & purpose of outputs

Specify which organisations will be using outputs



Please

Do not repeat what has been already produced

Explain how outputs will be used, not "can be" or "maybe" used

Avoid general statements & buzzwords

be realistic with your timeline



Example



BlueWaters project aims at development of the training programme for wastewater treatment operators. The project's consortium unites 5 partners and 5 associated organisations. In the course of project activities, the training programme is planned to be tested, evaluated, and further applied by 10 wastewater treatment plants outside the patnership. 55 organisations will be included in the email distribution list.

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
