5.1 Specific challenge to be adressed

The purpose of MUFA is to explore the preventive, accessible and timely support for multicultural and vulnerable families including war veterans. By mapping the phase and perceptions of every nation's identified staff using a digital governance tool; the project resets the mindset of the family employees to uptake the governance participatory method adjusted to designated target group of multicultural and vulnerable families including war veterans by each partner organisation. The purpose is to identify pain points and resistance areas, optimize training and change management, tailor communication for various contexts in the operating service areas and further investment. Lastly the e governance tool equips social and family workers with the skills and tools to meet their profession's evolving demands.





Tuas is responsible for coordinating the project and producing the content of the digital governance tool together with the partners. It is responsible for the technical development of the digital tool. Tuas has strong experience in international projects and health technology development. Tuas has experience in digital health and social care solutions and development of usability evaluation and user testing. Tuas has a larger project budget, as a coordinator and is involved in technical implementation: expertise, time and financial resources during the project.

The both University of Gdansk and Mykolas Romeris University from Lithuania have a strong knowledge in social and family work, its development and social political competence. They have extensive experience in international projects. They have identified multicultural competency development needs in social work. The University of Gdańsk excels in Baltic region enterprise activities and is well- connected in research and social enterprise within Baltic Sea Region.

5.2 Focus of the call

Digital governance tool can significantly enable improved communication, transparency and enhanced civic participation in small rural communities. Digital solutions such as digital governance platforms drive co-creation and participatory driven decision making; streamlines social services multicultural work, which can be particularly challenged in marginalized groups. The digital governance platform connects communities by social enterprise and collaboration. Overall, the digital governance tool bridges the gap between local authorities and citizens and therefore strengthens the local capacity and can bring investments.

6. Transnational relevance

The Baltic regional collaboration facilitates digital co-operation, balances civic innovation trust-based society. Relevance constitutes shared resources, knowledge, cross-border funding and broader peer review. Mutual understanding is built on goodwill, ethical principles cultural and educational exchange. Consequently, the digital governance tool strengthens governance; enhances Professional Practice and creates capacity- building.

7. Specific aims to be adressed

Building trust that could lead to further cooperation initiatives

Communication with access in various languages; visual view and guidance adapted for diverse clients and families; integrated feedback system for both users and staff; Al/chatbot assistant for culturally sensitive questions and a secure digital space for co-creating support plans between families and social workers; a dashboard for tracking progress, flagging missing documents, and providing timely alerts and. The co-creation of a digital governance tool facilitates common goals such as, a shared platform for decisions, processes and outcomes. It will support real-time evidence-based data sharing and reduce duplication in social care governance practices that will improve lives of multicultural families.





It will promote inclusion and equity from diverse regions sharing the same geographical challenges dispersed communities, aging populations and urban and rural divides.

It is important have different stakeholders from different nations integrate communities for social cohesion.

Initiating and keeping networks that are important for the BSR

It is important have different stakeholders from different nations, integrate communities and use frameworks such as Baltic Interreg. Small manageable sized projects support the coastal regions. The co-creation is fluid collaboration with local social enterprises(s) and scientific institutions. The regional differences are voiced within the digital tool. Sustainability and sharing costs and benefits are shared fairly.

Bringing the Programme closer to the citizens

The benefits to local employees and service users can be brought forward with case stories. Co-creation of the governance tool with service users and staff with local consultations. Mufa allows testing of usability, real time monitoring through the digital governance platform and direct platform for public messaging. Real time dashboard offers role response tracking and fast rollout to partners and key stakeholders.

Allowing a swift response to unpredictable and urgent challenges

Contingency actions would increase tech audit, fall back solution, data protection and cyber security expert to perform testing. The activation of swift contingency plan would include how to manage project delay including partner issues, policy shifts within government changes and project branding and messaging.

8. Target groups

Multicultural families and vulnerable clients such as refugees and war veterans represent a particularly vulnerable and often overlooked group. Their experiences, trauma, and specific needs require tailored approaches. This meaningful topic is not widely addressed yet, incorporating it brings a unique and meaningful dimension to the project. Multicultural families and respective allocation of vulnerable families and clients is decided by individual nations.
