5.1 Specific challenge to be adressed

The proposed project "Evidence-Informed Practice Manual for School Social Workers" (Guide4Welfare Manual) responds to a lack of a unified, evidence-informed, and contextually adapted framework to support school social workers (Fin. koulukuraattorit) in Finland, Sweden, Norway and Germany. These professionals face growing and complex challenges in supporting children and youth, such as bullying, anxiety, behavioral difficulties, and family disruptions.

To enhance professional practice, there is a pressing need for effective, research-based interventions across these countries. This project fosters international collaboration to develop a transnational perspective on improving public services for children and youth. It aims to provide practical tools tailored specifically for school social workers.

This support is particularly crucial in smaller rural areas, where established practices for addressing common European challenges—such as the integration of migrants—are less developed than in urban





centers. These disparities affect the responsiveness and effectiveness of school welfare services.

Through transnational collaboration, the project will collect, refine, and adapt approaches and methods to fit the educational and student support systems in Finland, Sweden, Norway, and Germany.

5.2 Focus of the call

This project fosters cohesive development by improving the quality of psychosocial support for young people in schools across Finland, Sweden, Norway, and Germany. It places particular emphasis on smaller municipalities and rural areas, where access to resources and specialist services is often limited.

To promote equal access to services, the project is developing a practical, user-friendly manual of Evidence-Informed Practices. This guide will help school professionals implement effective, context-sensitive interventions tailored to their communities.

The initiative prioritizes early intervention, active collaboration with families, and a deep respect for regional and cultural diversity. Through these efforts, it aims to strengthen wellbeing and resilience within school communities. This is especially relevant in small and rural areas, where cultural diversity may be more pronounced than in urban centers and could negatively impact the well-being of migrant youth.

6. Transnational relevance

Cooperation with partners from other Baltic Sea countries enables mutual learning, the exchange of best practices, and the development of a regionally adapted framework. Many countries in the Baltic Sea Region face similar challenges in school-based social work due to the growing demand for youth support services. Transnational cooperation can foster innovative approaches to enhancing local public services by deepening the understanding of the specific characteristics and roles of school social work in Finland, Sweden, Norway, and Germany. For instance, it can help identify effective strategies to support youth in rural schools who face common European challenges, such as developing language skills after migration—an issue that significantly affects their well-being and social intergation.

In Finland, the profession and training of school social workers are still relatively new. Therefore, insights gained through collaboration with other European and Baltic Sea Region countries can contribute to the advancement of training programs and professional practices. Within the scope of this project proposal, a transnational approach will enhance the quality and applicability of school social work methods, including the development of a practical manual. Moreover, the collaboration will strengthen professional networks and support the creation of scalable models that can be adapted across the Baltic Sea region.





7. Specific aims to be adressed

Building trust that could lead to further cooperation initiatives

There is a growing interest in evidence-informed social work among school social workers. Creating a manual for them could help increase interest in the welfare sector and encourage collaboration with our institution and others in the future.

Initiating and keeping networks that are important for the BSR

The planned project consortium will establish a valuable network within the Baltic Sea Region (BSR) in the field of Responsive Public Services, with a particular focus on expertise related to the well-being of young people.

Bringing the Programme closer to the citizens

By supporting the everyday work of school social workers, the project directly contributes to student well-being and educational equity. By working in rural and local schools, we can promote this program at the grassroots level, fostering engagement within schools and local communities.

Allowing a swift response to unpredictable and urgent challenges

There is growing concern about the well-being of young people in schools, and this manual can provide practical methods to support their mental health and overall welfare, also as a response to unpredictable and urgent challenges.

Main activities:

Needs analysis and stakeholder workshops for the development of the practice manual Co-development of the practice manual in transnational working groups Pilot testing of the practice manual in selected schools in Finland, Sweden, Norway and Germany Evaluation and refinement of the practice manual in transnational collaboration Dissemination of the practice manual & transnational learnings in webinars, print, and digital platforms

Outputs:

A digital and printable practice manual for school social workers in Baltic Sea Region Evaluation report created in transnational collaboration Transnational network of school social work professionals and interest groups

Use of outcomes:

School welfare professionals and municipalities will use the manual to guide and support their daily





practice. This is especially relevant in small rural areas, acknowledging common European problematics, such as migration and its influence in communication, well-being and collaboration with families
