5.1 Specific challenge to be adressed

The Baltic border regions as well as the Nordic border regions in general have faced severe challenges over the last few years. First there was the pandemic that tore our countries apart from each other and largely demolished what had been built up over decades: trust, integration, labour market regions.





Then came the Russian invasion of Ukraine, which has brought the Baltic border regions, and all the Nordic countries, a challenge not seen since World War II. In order to live up to the objective in both the EU Baltic Strategy and the Nordic Council of Ministers' Vision the cross-border cooperation in border regions needs to get more attention.

Border regions are very often rural, sparsely populated and remote. They are especially vulnerable, their resilience and economic development are depending on integration and cooperation across borders. That specific work, the cross-border cooperation and the efficiency, competence and methods of the parties involved is the main challenge this project will address. The results and experiences, if we reach our objectives, can be used throughout the Baltic Area and all border regions within the EU for that matter.

5.2 Focus of the call

With partners from five (so far, we hope to get positive answers from Estonia as well) countries the project intends to, just as the Nordic vision and the EU Baltic Sea strategy states, integrate them better. The focus for us is the integration in border regions. They are mainly rural, small places and experience all the difficulties that brings. But they also suffered severely from both the pandemic and the recent issues regarding security and not the least preparedness.

Border regions are more exposed to these problems and issues as they are the periphery of the nations. But they are also the gates for integration with other nations, very often with limited local and regional resources. Better integration, more efficient cross-border development and because of that more resilient border regions will strengthen them all - both short and long term.

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6. Transnational relevance

Nordic, Baltic and border region cooperation cannot be neither performed nor developed without transnational cooperation - it is the core of it all.

The Project idea originates from frustration within the Cross Border Committees over not being able to create the most integrated and sustainable region in the world – which is what the Nordic Council of Ministers has stated as the vision. They need competence, they need to form and sustain networks and arenas for cooperation, and they need methods and platforms for better efficiency.

The focus is transnational, cross-border. To try to do this on a national, or even bi-lateral, scale would not only be in vain, but it would also be truly sub-optimal and a waste of resources.

So, there is no "Transnational Relevance", the project IS transnational from the original idea forward. We truly believe that results and experiences form our small project will be of great use to other





stakeholders in the area, and possibly throughout the EU.

7. Specific aims to be adressed

Building trust that could lead to further cooperation initiatives

The partners in the project are spread throughout all the Nordics and especially around the Baltic Sea. The project aims to bring them all closer and integrate their work of trying to make border regions more resilient, integrated and effective.

For that to happen all stakeholders need to trust one another and BRERIE aims to support that through several activities in the project. To meet, to work together and to describe, address and discuss mutual challenges will help to build that trust. In addition, we hope to get side effects through new constellations finding that they can do things together, small or big.

Initiating and keeping networks that are important for the BSR

The partners all connect through several different networks already today. Some are in many, some in few. What we aim to achieve are broader networks for regional, cross-border and shared development and integration. Thereby experiences, competence and resources can be used more effectively to build resilient and effective (border) regions.

Activities in BRERIE will address this and initially assess needs, currently existing connections and build there. Some of the existing fora might be to macro focused, some might be to narrow and micro focused. If there are existing networks where the partners already take part, with a focus that match our objectives, we only need to inject new energy, challenges and resources there.

Allowing a swift response to unpredictable and urgent challenges

More effective cross-border cooperation will always be a useful and robust foundation for development of resilient societies in the affected regions. BRERIE does not, however, aim to build responsiveness or systems for security and preparedness in the partnership regions. The project will work on the level above – to develop the abilities (competence, networks, methods etc) of the stakeholders in their cross-border cooperation. That, in turn, will give effects such as responsiveness, resilience, efficiency in rural and remote societies and much more.

8. Target groups

We have tried to build a partnership that also reflects our target groups. We aim to reach and involve





the stakeholders of the important work we are focusing: the the cross-border development and cooperation.

The Cross Border Committees of the Nordic Council of Ministers, which make up for the majority of the partnership, have different ways of organizing both practically and judicially. The majority of them are politically governed, with owners or members on the board of directors.

Our primary target group is therefore those groups of stakeholders: the people holding the responsibility for the cross-border cooperation and development in border regions. These are mainly regional or local (municipal) public authorities. This also includes the people working in the cross-border committees, of course. We have the objective of engaging also an Estonian partner with these competencies and more or less the same challenges. That has however not been confirmed when posting this Project Idea Form.

Secondly, we aim to involve the local and regional stakeholders as well. All cross-border cooperation is not undertaken by the CBCs, and BRERIE wants to enable more to participate, both in the project and afterwards.

10. Partnership

We have tried to build the partnership of all the twelve official Cross border Committees (CBCs) within the framework of the Nordic Council of Ministers. That is the basis for the idea and for the common challenge we face. They all share the same "WHY".

The CBCs all bring different things to the table. Different competencies, different experiences and





different local practical challenges. We have also approached an Estonian partner but have not yet received a final accept from them. The list of partners are as shown blow, with partners listed that have accepted to take part.

CBCs:

- Nordkalottrådet: Northmost part of Finland, Norway and Sweden. Partner, part financier, workgroup
- Tornedalsrådet: Along the Torne River in Finland, Sweden and Norway. partner, part financier, workgroup
- MidtSkandia: Västerbotten and Nordland counties in Sweden and Norway. Partner, part financier, workgroup
- Kvarken Council: Ostrobotnia (FI), Västerbotten (SE) and Västernorrland (SE) on both sides of the Kvarken Strait. partner, part financier, workgroup
- Fellesrådet: Jämland/Härjedalen (SE) and Tröndelag (NO) counties. Partner, part financier, workgroup
