





Relevance






- Is the idea relevant for the **Programme** and its **focus**?
- Is it in line with any of the Programme's **objectives**?
- Does it cover **certain requirements** (e.g. work packages,
 - pilot activities, solutions, etc.)?







Start with the CHALLENGE



Be realistic and focused!

If a challenge is complicated try to deal with some of its aspects!

Relevance



Think TRANSNATIONAL

Why is transnational cooperation needed to address the challenge? Have you selected the most relevant countries to be covered in the partnership?

Justify why the project is relevant for the Baltic Sea region!








Don't forget your TARGET GROUPS

Definition: Organisations that are affected by the challenge and have the competences or mandate to influence it.



Be aware of your target groups' needs at the stage of application!






Idea of a solution

- helps your target groups
- transnational
- complete
- tested, evaluated, adjusted
- durable
- new or modified



Work plan




Structure of the work plan

- three predefined work packages: prepare, test, transfer your solution
- in each work package: **up to five** groups of activities
- group of activities: ends with either a deliverable or an output
- o **deliverable:** intermediary step to reach a particular output
- o **output:** ready solution prepared, piloted, evaluated and adjusted

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o management of your project: to be planned separately from the work plan





Work plan: example



Lack of innovative tools and methods in business counseling for SMEs



Deliverables 6-step counseling process concept + guideline Tool to graduate challenges + guideline



2 piloting rounds Evaluation of the pilots' results Amendments after the pilots



Output = Solution Concept + tool + guidelines piloted, evaluated, adjusted





Project idea form (PIF)

- Compulsory step
- $\circ~$ Basis for consultations
- Templates available at https://interreg-baltic.eu/gateway/consultations/
- Should be sent to: <u>idea@interreg-baltic.eu</u>
- PIFs are submitted not later than:
 - ✓ 9 March 2022 small projects
 - ✓ **15 March 2022** core projects

Application procedure



Request for access to BAMOS+

- Template available at https://interreg-baltic.eu/gateway/bamos-account/
- Lead applicant applies for log in to BAMOS+ via E-mail: <u>account@bamos.eu</u>
- Requests for access to BAMOS+ are submitted not later than:
 - ✓ 16 March 2022 small projects
 - ✓ **12 April 2022** core projects
- Access to BAMOS+ is granted after 8 February 2022



Submission of the application and other documents

• All documents are submitted in the digital format in BAMOS+ only

- \checkmark application form
- ✓ partner declarations
- ✓ contact information
- ✓ bank information
- Must be submitted not later than:
 - ✓ 30 March 2022 small projects
 - ✓ 26 April 2022 core projects


